programming, gives parents some powerful tips on how to harness television for the pre-school/elementary child.

■ Ask simple questions about the programs young children

watch. It's best if you can watch with them but if that's not possible, try to catch a few minutes of the program. You may be surprised about how much they understand once they're asked to explain it.

■ Play "real or make believe?" Could an object move by itself, or could an animal talk? "Can the child guess how it was done, if it couldn't happen in real life? Why does he or she think the effect was done?"

■ Let TV programs lead to other activities. Have the child draw pictures of the whales he or she saw in that nature documentary. Make up a super hero. Have the child make a list of the super hero's extraordinary powers.

ers. Act out or videotape your own TV show.

■ During program breaks, ask children what they think will happen next. Compare their prediction with what does happen. Ask if they think the characters would really do what they did. Why or why not?

■ Give young children easy-to-understand categories of the different things they see on TV and make a game of spotting them.

For example, is TV trying to sell them something, or entertain them?

In these powerful ways, parents can actually use television actively with children to promote thinking in a creative and analytical manner.

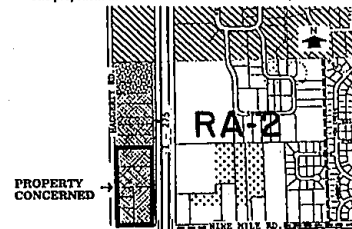
