"I certainly don't want to try the case now and again two years from now. The family of the victims, they don't want to go through a case twice. They want closure."

Madzia is also the prosecutor in Davis' trial, which is expected to follow the conclusion of Cayco's.

Cayce's. Davis' attorney, Jose Fanego, naked for separate trials for fear "that a joint trial could projudice one or both of the defendants. I'm happy that Judgo Howard granted separate trials, because it shows me that he is concerned about insuring fair trials for both men. Some judges would stick the trials together to asve time, but I'm very impressed that Judge Howard had (this) legal insight."

But Judge Howard gave a dif-ferent reason. "They are being tried separately because they may have different alibis," he said.
