Three area students will be packing more than just clothing as they head off for college next fall — they will bring with them a four-year scholarship from the H.T. Ewald Foundation for Higher Education.

Marina Lemberg of West Bloomfield Township, Frank McCormick of Toy and Brandon Smith of Beverly Hills each won between \$500 and \$2,500 for their academics and outside activities.

"Among this year's winners are students who have excelled, not only in academics and othletics, but in service to others. They have accomplished much outside of the classroom," said a H.T. Ewald Foundation representative.

Lemberg graduated form Farmington Hills North High School and will attend the Uni-versity of Michigan. Born in the former U.S.S.R., she has been a zemi-finalist in the National Library of Poetry contests, and
