On an early October Sunday, some Farmington Hills residents will join people from around the state in Lansing in a "Stand for Children."

The idea came from a National Stand for Children rally in Washington, D.C. in June during which more than 200,000 people demonstrated support for chil-dren's issues at the nation's capi-tol. More than 3,000 of the demonstrators, including Annette Hohl, Miss Farmington, attended that national rally.

But Lisa Ann Smith, a member of the Farmington Hills Commission on Children, Youth and Families, said it was important to show the same concern at a state level.


