The department is emphasizing the use and maintenance of smoke detectors as one of the best deterrents to serious fire incidents.

Although 13 of every 14 homes have at least one smoke detector, almost half of home fires 3 in 6 fire deaths occur in the share of homes with no detectors. Thousands of people still die each year in home fires where smoke detectors aren't present.

Having a smoke detector cuts your chance of dying nearly in half if you have a home fire, by properly placing, regularly testing and maintaining your detectors, you can ensure that they are in fact working and will alert you if a fire breaks out.

IN addition to offering information on smoke detector and fire safety, the department will offer a lot of entertainment and

educational programs.
Hendlining this year's event will be "Deputy Dash Dakota and Clint Driftwood" who will bring their entertaining message on fire safety fresh from a tour of several area schools.

The action begins at noon with a stove fire demonstration followed by a fire fighter challenge, shows by "Deputy Dash Dakota and Clint Driftwood, and the clown troupe, a show by "Zippy" the clown and repeat performances until 4 p.m.

There will be fire truck displays, guests like Louie the Lightning Bug, Sparky, Herbie, Smoky T. Bear, a fire safety smoke house for practice escapes, live demonstrations of the Jaws of Life extrication equipment and a kitchen fire demonstration along with booths for Botsford General and Huron Valley hospitals, the Oakland County Sheriff's Marine Safety Division, Detroit Edison, Consumers power and others.
