

## Clarenceville's carnival proceeds to pay for enrichment programs

The \$3,000 raised from Clarenceville's recent carnival will become the seed money for a new Alumni and Friends' Foundation now being set up in the school district.

Once launched, the foundation will pay for "enrichment" projects not funded by the district.

"We need to draw up the papers to get a tax-deferred status," said Superintendent Tom Tattan.

The Clarenceville district includes a southeast portion of Farmington Hills.

The Clarenceville Board of

Education recently accepted the \$3,000 raised from the carnival. It's now in a special account, awaiting the formal creation of the foundation.

Many school districts have a similar "friends" group which raises money from alumni and residents and businesses in the district.

In fact, Plymouth-Canton, the district Tattan just came from, has one which the district relies on heavily to fund special projects, Tattan said.

"It pays for enrichment things above and beyond those paid for by the district," Tattan said. "If you want to have a quality pro-

gram, you have to go beyond that."

Teachers can turn to the foundation to get small amounts of money to buy supplies for extra classroom projects.

As money is received, it is funneled back into the classroom through grants given to teachers who apply for one.

"The purpose is to support teaching and learning," Tattan said.

The district is preparing brochures which will explain how to make tax-exempt donations to the foundation.

## Former AD criticizes police in Moeller incident

In his just-released book, "From the Inside, a Half-Century of Michigan Athletics," former U-M athletic director Don Canham takes the Southfield Police Department to task for its handling of the Gary Moeller restaurant incident in 1995.

Moeller, who was Michigan's football coach at the time, became loud and unruly after having too much to drink at the Excalibur restaurant on Franklin Road one evening and was arrested by Southfield police.

Because of his celebrity status, there was a flood of requests for information from both newspaper and broadcast media and the Southfield police wound up releasing both transcripts of

their reports and audio tapes of their encounter with Moeller.

The release of that information, Canham writes, was "an unethical move prior to any indictment. The news media seized the story and played it to the hilt. What should have and could have been handled in a dignified way became a national story, even featured in *Sports Illustrated*. Gary needed defend-

The firing, Canham said, was done at the insistence of James Duderstadt, who was the university's president. Canham spends quite a bit of space lambasting Duderstadt's tenure and policies. From the inside, however, "isn't one of those tell-all books," Canham said. "But it's not all

hearts and flowers, either."

The 304-page soft-cover book is written with Larry Paladino, staff reporter for the Southfield and Birmingham newspapers of the Observer and Eccentric chain. He became acquainted with Canham during his 12 years of covering U-M sports while with the Associated Press in Detroit.

The book is filled with anecdotes, many of them humorous, accumulated by Canham in his 60 years at Michigan as an athlete, coach and athletic director. He first went to U-M in 1938 on a track scholarship.

Published by Olympia Sports Press of Ann Arbor, the book is available at local bookstores.
