their reports and audic tapes of their encounter with Moeller.

The release of that information, Canham writes, was "an unethical move prior to any indictment. The news media seized the story and played it to the hitt. What should have and could have been handled in a dignified way became a national story, even featured in Sports Illustrated. Gary needed defending.

The firing, Canham said, was done at the insistence of James Duderstadt, who was the university's president. Canham spends quite a bit of space lambasting Duderstadt's tenure and policies. From the Inside, however, "isn't one of these tell-all books,"

The 304-page soft-cover book is written with Larry Paladino, staff reporter for the Southfield and Birmingham newspapers of the Obsorver and Ecentric chain. He became acquainted with Canham during his 12 years of covering U-M sports while with the Associated Press in Detroit.

The book is filled with anecdotes, many of them humorous, accumulated by Canham in his 50 years at Michigan as an athlete, coach and athletic director. He first went to U-M in 1938 on a track scholarship.
