Harrison takes city golf crown

The greens may have been dimpled, but you'd be hard-pressed to find so much a dimple's worth of space between Farmington, Farmington Hills Harrison and North Farmington in the city high school golf championship.

Harrison squeaked out the win by the margin of a missed shot, edging Farmington 205-206, with North Farmington third with a 210 total.

"That's the closest it's been in

years," said Coach Bill Spencer of Harrison, which had the medalist in Brian Grohman and his par-equaling 36 at San Marino Golf Club.

"Grohman played very well," Farmington coach James Miner said. "The greens were recently aerated, so there were dimpled holes all over the place. It was tough to putt on."

Only two other golfers broke 40, both Falcons. Derek Fox and Pat Hickey both shot 39. Team-

mate Nick Katchorian had a 42 while Tim Flutur and John Knight each carded 43s.

The schools sent their golfers out in threesomes, beginning with their No. 6 players and going up so the last to tee off -- and finish -- were each team's No. 1 seed.

Harrison had Chris Scott at 40, Jeff Boxman at 41 and both Adam Kindon and Dave Bozak at 44.

North Farmington's Andrew

Wantuck shot a 40 and Brandon Finkel a 41. Derek Spicer was at 42, Chris Reading at 43 and Dave Rosner chalked up a 44.

"It came down to the last group," Miner said. "If we had tied, we would have lost anyway. It would have gone to sixth man, and we lost it there, too."

Ahh, but everybody came up winners. It was a nice sunny day with just enough of a nip in the air to keep golfers sharp. And scores low.
