The sentencing date has been changed for Itsumi Koga, the Japanese woman convicted of killing her infant son last November.

Koga, 35 pleaded guilty by mentally iil to voluntary manslaughter in Oakland County Creuit Court on Sept. 3. She had originally been charged with first degree murder, which would have carried a mandatory life sentence.

Koga was living with her husband Akihiro and her 28-day-old son Tomayuki at the Citation Club Apartments. Her sister was also visiting from Japan when she took her son to a pond behind her building late on Not. I and dropped him into it.

The woman was suffering from depression and has been under a psychiatriat's acare. Since March, she has been living at her partment on a tether.

The case, which received inter-national attention, has brought to light the issue of post partum depression, a sometimes debili-tating condition for new moth-

ers.
