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If you're unsure about starting or adding to an art collection, or even just viewing art works, be sure to make the move to Our Town, the annual exhibit and sale at The Community House in Birmingham.

The event, now in its 11th year, presents works by artists from around the state — many of them from this area. It also gives visitors special opportunities to demystify and remove any intimidation about art.

This year's Our Town will feature freewheeling discussions by gallery owners on gallery operations and any other art-related questions. Selected Our Town artists will talk about the creative process. Interior designers will give artistic interior design solutions. All these are scheduled enrichment workshops, each with \$5 admission.
