with outmoded policies and procedures.

"I wouldn't necessarily do away with any existing departments," Hogan said, "But I would take a fresh approach, and examine every aspect of our operations."

Besides having worked with the Oakland sheriff's department, Hogan has worked with departments in Wayne and Livingston counties. "I know how they should operate, I do understand the sheriff's operation."

Hogan scoffs at the idea he might not have enough experience in running a juil — something his opponent said is "75 percent of the sheriff's responsibility."

Hogan said he bulieves in alternative sentencing procedures — such as work release, tethering and boot camps. "It's tender in the said." I believe there should be alternatives to simply warehousing people in jail."
Among the innovations he would implement as sheriff, thogan said, is closer liaison with schools — as with expanded DARE programs — and the community. "Police have a habit of assuming they know all about ganga, drugs and other phases of police work. But we police have to be more involved in the community, so they are not simply reacting to problems."
Hogan said women and minorities should be encouraged within the department so the sheriff's department reflects the diversity of the community.

recidivisim rate less than the regular jail population, he said.

Nichols said he even enjoys going to boot camp graduation coveriese, where former disciplinary problems demonstrate promise. "I'm not part of the moral majority," he said, "but we make boot camp inmates go to church."

The sheriiff also enjoys hearing from their parents. "One father told me his son had never before addressed him as 'sir."

"He wanted to know what we did to his son," said the sheriiff. Nichols foresees more crime and more criminals ahead as the county grows. "More people mean more crime," he said.

"I come from the achool of police work that says if you do wrong, you're going to be punished." alid Nichols, "and you should be punished rapidly and fairly. I don't believe in moly-caddling criminals, and I don't believe in finding exuses."

Even so, Nichola docen't believe locking people up—warehousing human beings—is mecessarily the answer, particularly for nonvisiont offenders.

With more people destined to be wards of the criminal justice system, he sees a bigger need for

alternative programs such as work release and the boot camp. Gangs are an emerging prob-lem in Oakland, Nichols said. Thus there may be a need for a bootcamp for juveniles — male and female. "If you don't turn kids around while they're young, you may never be able to," he said.

In the next four years, Nichols said he'd like to see his department emerge as a coordinating organization that supplies support services — high tech rimes investigation, for example — to other law enforcement agencies.

Nichols desent' want the sheriff's department to become a super police agency. But there should be greater coordination

between police agencies — for complicated cases, or a police presence at World Cub Soccer or Cruisin' Woodward.
