Mustangs edge Raiders for title

Whitney Crosby is one of the big reasons why Livonia Stevenson is headed back to the state Class A girls tennis tournament. The Junior and No. 1 singles player for the Spartans carried her momentum from winning the Western Lakes Activities Association title by capturing the regional top flight crown last Friday in Ann Arbor.

Stevenson was one of three teams out of the Ann Arbor regional to qualify for the state meet Oct. 18-19 in Midland.

Two Ann Arbor teams, Huron (24 points) and Pioneer (19) earned the automatic bids, while Stevenson, reaching at least the semifinals in all seven flights, scored 17 points to beat the minimum score of 16.

Crosby, the top seed, raised her season record to 21-2 with 6-3, 6-2 win over No. 2 seed Kendra Clark of Ypsilanti. The Stevenson junior beat Livonia Franklin's Cherie Berner (6-0, 6-0) and Saline's Linda Acus (6-2, 6-1) en route to the finals.

Stevenson coach Frank Dotson believes Crosby, who went 1-1 last year before losing to state runner-up Megan Kearney of Okemos, could be among the top eight seeds.

"Whitney is a very dedicated and capable athlete," Dotson said. "She has a good middle game. She's able to come to the net off her serve and score points."

In the WLAA tournament (Oct. 8), Crosby avenged one of her two losses on the year by upending top seed Becky Clanton of Walled Lake Central in three sets, 6-3, 1-6, 7-6 (winning the tiebreaker 7-2).

Clanton had won the last three meetings between the two including last year's WLAA final and a dual-meet encounter earlier this year at Central, 6-1, 6-1.

Northville, the WLAA dual-meet champion with a 10-0-1 record, held off North Farmington, which was 10-1 in duals, by a single point, 23 to 22, to claim the WLAA crown outright.

The outcome of the meet wasn't decided until Monday when a make-up match for the No. 3 doubles title was decided.

Seniors Maria Nikou and Courtney Vinco of Stevenson kept North from gaining a share of the Western Lakes meet crown by defeating junior Rachel Wool and sophomore Liz Schnaar of North, 6-4, 4-6, 6-1.

The win gave Stevenson 21 points, good enough for the Spartans who also finished third in the dual meet campaign with a 9-1-1 record.

Meanwhile, Sara Kloosterman of Farmington Hills Harrison won the No. 2 flight with a 7-5, 3-6, 6-4 win over junior Rachel Wool of North in a battle of top seeds.

At No. 3 singles, North junior Sarah Hand, a finalist a year ago, won the title this time by defeating Northville's Federica Rogod in straight sets, 6-2, 6-2.

Jonny Androuse of Northville captured the No. 4 singles by downing senior Jennifer Yen of North, 6-0, 6-3.

Northville won the first two doubles crowns.
