Drugs led to death in hospital lot

Farmington Hills police say a drug over-dose appears to have caused the death of a Livonia woman, who was found in the Bous-ford General Hospital parking lot on Oct. 1.

"The toxicology reports indicate an excess amount of opiates were present," said Hills Police Inspector Marty Bledsoc. "We had information that she had abused drugs excessively before. This was not a complete shock to people who knew her."

The woman, Sheryl Ann Livingston, 35, was found in the back seat of a red Chevy Cavalier in the parking lot of Botsford General Hospital on Grand River at about 2:30 p.m. Oct. 1.

A visitor and one of the valet parking attendants noticed that the woman was not moving and called hospital security. They then called Community EMS. The woman was pronounced dead at the scene.

Police do not know whether the mother of three had driven herself to the emergency room or had been driven there by someone else. The car was in the ER lot.

"There's no indication of foul play," Bled-soe said. "Wo're still trying to find out how she got there."

Police said the woman had been found stretched out in the back seat of the car, with no apparent signs of trauma, leading passersby to think she was napping. She had not been seen by her husband for

two days. Some sources had told police that she was at a party two days before where drugs were being used.

Bledsoe said the woman had previously overdosed on heroin.

"It's a regrettable result," he said, "People can have a bad reaction from prescription Grugs. But this lady did not use that kind of pharmacist that most people do."

Bledsoe said that even though friends knew of her drug use, they were still saddened by her loss.

"Someone may well have been trying to get her some help," he said. "That's what we're trying to find out."

Driver pleads no contest in bicyclist's death

A California man, who was drunk when the car ho was driving struck and killed a woman on a bicycle, will be sentenced Nov. 6.

James Hein, 41, of Del Mar California, pleaded no contest to driving under the influence of alcohol resulting in death on Oct. 9 before Judgo Robert Anderson in Oakland Circuit Court. Hein, who is free on \$10,000 personal bond, could receive up to 15 years in prison for the felony.

The victim, Elenya Rainbow, 45, was staying at the Red Roof Inn on Sinacola in Farmington Hills while visiting her parents in Farmington. The avid bicyclist was bicycling back to her hotel at about 10:15 p.m. when the 1985 Mercury Marquis driven by Hein struck her.

The woman suffered severe head injuries and was pronounced dead at the scene.
