"This is really the beginning of a community based service plan," Kaufman said, "We'll con-tinue to have our main bus lines, but have more specialized ser-vices as well."
Kaufman said Harrison Town-

ship in Macomb County and Farmington Hills are the first two communities to have the specialized transportation. Dearborn Heights and Warren will also take part.

Dan Potter, Hills director of special services, said the city will receive the use of two seven-passenger mini-vans later this year for the city's senior citizons program, and another 15-passenger bus next year.

These are primarily aimed at our youth and seniors pro-

our youth and seniors pro-grams," Potter said.

The bus will be used to take youngsters on field trips and transport them from one center,

such as the Costick Center, to another, such as the ice arena. Mayor Vagnozzi said the bus could also be used if the youth program can be run during the summer, which has been discussed. The Farmington Public Schools now transports students to the Costick Center and will take them to the other two centers -- the ice arena and the YMCA - during the school year. SMART picks up 80 percent of the cost of the buses, with the city matching with 20 percent that is already budgeted. "This will certainly help with both our seniors and youth programs," Vagnozzi said.
