

POLICE AND FIRE CALLS

Listed below are some of the Farmington-area police incidents, fire calls and court cases reported during the past week.

FIRE

In Farmington Hills: Firefighters from Station 2 responded to a car fire at a three-car accident on Orchard Lake at the I-696 interchange at 7:39 a.m. Oct. 16. Firefighters put about 100 gallons of water on the fire that destroyed a \$20,000 1994 Volvo 850 Turbo and caused \$100 in damage to the contents.

BREAK-INS
