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State board tangled up over 'character education'

BY TIM RICHARD STAFF WHITER After a long gestation, the State Board of Educa-tion is due to give birth today to a resolution advis-ing public schools to do "character education." The question is: Will it embody values such as "respect, responsibility, caring, trustworthiness, justice, fairness, civic virtue and citizanship," as proposed by Superintendent of Public Instruction Art Ellis? Art Ellis?

proposed by Superintendent of Public Instruction Art Ellia? Or will it be laced with references to God, Bible lessons and parents, as advocated by board presi-dent Clark Durant, R-Grosse Pointo? The eight member State Board has been tangled on the issue since July. It didn't take up the mat-ter in August and Soptember. The October meeting is's scheduled to start at 9:30 a.m. in the fourth floor of the John A. Hannah Building, 603 W. Allegan about two blocks west of the State Capitol in Lansing, Public, comment is scheduled for 1 p.m. Three are signs many consider it a tempest in a tappot. Tim Kelly, Gov. John Engler's representa-tive to the board, already has said the body has supent too much time on it. Louis Legg III, R-Battle Creek, Gov. Engler's lat-cate appointee to fill a board vacancy, higs hinted ho is less than ecstatic over the dragged-out argu-ment.

Values always have been, and continuit to be, taught by capable, caring educatives throughout our public school system. DOOK. Many of Michigan's 560 public school districts long have tried to teach values of character, though not necessarily in a systematic way and not necessarily the same values. Durant apparently had a hand in drafting the

first resolution, which emphasizes "fundamental rights of parents" and places parents and religious leaders in prominent spots to be on local school district drafting committees. And Durant touched a raw nerve among many when he said, in an out-of-theroom interview with a brandenster, that Bible isotries could be used to teach character. Board member Dorothy Beardmore, R-Rochester, offered a counter-proposal. It says American values "transcend religious beliefs." She cited the values 'of "respect, responsibility, caring, trustworthiness, justice and fairness, and civic virtue and citizenship." The Beardmore draft places responsibility on "public schools to provide character éducation," without mentioning whit interest groups should be on the local districts committee. And it under-scores "constitutional separation" of church and state," to which Marilyn Lundy, "R-Grosso Pointe and a Durant supporter, atrongly objects. A Taxas company sells a curriculum in building character, but the State Board, as a matter of poli-cy, refuses to endorse any one curriculum or text-book.
