CC wins boys crown

Detroit Catholic Central won its third straight Catholic League championship (seventh in the last nine years) Saturday and is one of the favorites to win the Class A regional at Royal Oak Kimball.

CC won the league meet with 36 points. Birmingham Brother Rice was second (64), and Dearborn Divine Child was third (88).

Warren DeLaSalle's Neal Sobek was the top individual, finishing the course in 15:51.

CC's John Griffin (16:28) and Chris Lancey (16:44) were third and fourth, respectively. Anthony Wolfe took eighth (16:57) and Dan Danic ninth (16:57).

Mark Coleman, the only junior among CC's top seven, was 12th (17:10). Ryan Schriber 13th (17:01) and Craig Skalski 19th (17:22).

"If we ran like we were sup-

posed to, no one should have beaten us," CC coach Tony Magni said. "During the season, no one's second man bent our second man."

CC followed that up with a victory Tuesday in the Operation Friendship meet at Orchard Lake St. Mary with 34 points.

- Enacted ordinance amending requirements for dumpster locations and screening.

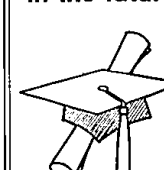
