ly crossed midfield.
 "The Falcons took a 3-1 lead when Randy Sage converted a penalty kick, driving the ball to the right corner just ahead of Munro's reach with 36:49 remaining.
 The Raiders (5-7-4) closed the difference to a goal five minutes later when sophomore Craig Hearn, following a corner kick by Jim Donner and scramble in front, punched the ball through.
 "That's a position we've been in," North coach Ron Meteyer said, recalling the Raiders rolled from a 3-1 deficit to tie Livonia Franklin.

"The difference is we were aggressive in the second half and took the play to (Franklin). We seemed to have a hard time mounting an attack this time.

"(The Falcons) were going to clear the ball long. That's good strategy; I would have done the same thing. After we got the corner-kick goal, they looked more defensively, deprived our forwards of the ball and kept us from penetrating."

North played the last 23 minutes without Hearn, who suffered a bruised hip as a result of a hard fall late in the first half, reducing his mobility.

"Once you put ice on it, I don't want to put someone back in," Meteyer said. "That certainly changed our attack."

"They were double- and triple-teaming him. If he hadn't injured the hip, he might have been better able to deal with that."

Hearn scored both goals in the first game with Farmington, and the Falcons made it a primary objective to mark him closer with Kenta Tsushima and Brad

Gerwatowski.
 "We played a man tight on him the whole time, and that took him right out of the game," Juncal said.

In addition to Rais, Juncal cited the contributions of Todd Afterbaugh, Zak Papper and Ian Gray on defense; Sage, Chad Goshorn and Falcon in the midfield; Phil Wantin at forward and Scott Marrell in goal.

"Give credit to Farmington," Meteyer said. "They played a very physical, attacking type of game, and that's what they needed to do. They needed to assert themselves and they did."

What goes around comes around, the old saying goes, and it was true Tuesday night for Farmington's girls basketball team.

Walled Lake Western edged Farmington 43-39 to leave both schools with 5-6 records in the Western Lakes Activities Association.

The host Warriors are 7-8 overall and the Falcons 7-9.

"What won the game for us last week against North Farmington was our rebounding," Farmington coach John Verdura said. "That's exactly what lost us this game."

"The score was tied with less than a minute to go. They put up a shot; it missed, but (Gina) Brooke put it back in."

"We didn't rebound well enough to win, and maybe we didn't deserve to win."

Brooke wound up with 19 points, the only Western scorer in double figures, while Amanda Porter paced all scorers with 22 points for Farmington.

The Falcons held an 8-7 lead after one period, but the Warriors went up 17-15 at the half. Farmington regained the lead 29-27 after three periods but couldn't hang on to it.

Farmington made 13 of 15 free throws. Western sank nine of 20 with half the 20 attempts coming in the fourth quarter.

HARRISON 66, STEVENSON 29: Junior guard Amy Robie scored 20 points Tuesday to lead Farmington Harri-

son to its triumph of Livonia Stevenson in the Western Lakes game.

The host Hawks scored a 21-4 lead in the first quarter, outscored Stevenson by five over the next two periods and piled up a 20-5 margin in the fourth to put the game away.

Robie also went 7-of-7 from the free throw line as the Hawks raised their WLAA mark to 6-4 in a 9-6 season. The Spartans dropped to 3-7 in the league, 6-9 overall.

Junior guard Mahogany Fletcher and sophomore Ali Ault scored 10 apiece points for Harrison. Senior center Gina Palmeri paced Stevenson with 10.

NORTH 64, CHURCHILL 45: North Farmington rode a hot second quarter Tuesday to its win over Livonia Churchill.

The Raiders piled up a 23-8 margin over the host Chargers in the second quarter to expand a 14-13 first-quarter edge into a commanding lead. North outplayed a 27-24 edge in the second half.

"They were hot and we weren't," Churchill coach Dave Balog said of the second period.

Kelly Fournier scored 16 points and Katie Vintile added 14 to pace the Raiders. Churchill got 15 points from Jessie Jenkins and 12 from Terri Owens.

"If I could get rid of that second quarter, I'd be happy," Balog said. "And it would be nice to put on another quarter

at the end. I think we could have beaten them 35-29 after three quarters.

MARIAN 85, MERCY 60: Junior Breen Wales sparked the Mustangs with a season-high 21 points Tuesday. Stacey Yankovich and Michele Emig scored 12 points each; Kellie Byers added 10.

Kelahn Brooks had 15 points to lead Mercy, which dropped to 2-7 in the Catholic League Central Division and 8-8 overall.

Merian, which grabbed a 19-14 advantage after one quarter and held a comfortable 37-25 lead at the half, improved to 7-2 in division play and 12-3 overall.

On Thursday, a rematch with Dearborn Divine Child ended in another close loss Thursday for the Marlinas, 40-43. Mercy lost the first game by one point.
