As Bob Dole brought his never-say-die message to Troy, he emphasized the issues he believes will yet carry him into the White House.

Concluding a two-day campaign blitz in Michigan, Dele came to Firefighters Park Tuesday talking about character, his proposed 15 percent tax cut and touting American family values.

And he struck a chord. The crowd — estimated at about 2,000 by Troy police — responded with gusto, often cheering and occasionally interrupting with "Dole/Kemp" cheers.



"This man is a savior," said Thano Merrick of Bloom field Hills. "Dole can still save the country from going to the hell of socialism."

"I'm impressed," said Bob Ernewein of Southfield. "I still think we can win," he said, despite the polls (showing Dole trailing Clinton by 10 to 16 percentage points).


It was a near-perfect setting as Dole's charter bus, Asphalt I, rolled into the park about 12:40 p.m. with flags flying. The campaign bus — with national media in tow — graced railies in Frankenmuth and Grand Blancariler in the day. The next scheduled stop was Columbus, Ohio.

The sky was a little overcast most of the time. But occasionally the sun broke through, highlighting the

Sheriff John F. Nichols and a host of police officers formed an impressive backdrop for presidential hopeful Bob Dole as he decried crime, including the increased use of illegal drugs.

The men and women in uniform respectfully stood at attention as Dole gratefully accepted endorsements from organizations including the Police Officers' Association of Michigan and the Michigan Deputy Sheriffs' Association.

Furthermore, as Dole seemed to be basking in the warm glow.




