Hawks stage tourney upset

Some wins are just wins; some are cod wins, and then there are really

Farmington Harrison's gitle basketball team had one of the latter Thursday in the first round of the Western Lakes Activities Association tournament.
The Hawks produced a shocker with their 36-32 defeat of defending champion and host Walled Lake Central.
It just might be the biggest victory in Harrison history, but the Hawks might not find that so surprising.
Harrison, which lost by three to the Vikings in the regular season,

played with a collective confidence and a defensive intensity that limited all-state center Becky Cummings to 11 points.

"In the locker room, nobody was nervous; everybody was relaxed," Harrison coach Pete Mantyla said. "If we ran our system a little better, with the same kind of effort we had last time, we knew we could be right there at the end with a chance to win."

It was also Harrison's first tournament win during Mantyla's six-year tenure. His teams have been in the playoffs the last five years.

The fifth-seeded Hawks (11-6) advance to the semifinal round Tuesday and will play at top-seeded Northville. Central (11-6) plays host

to Livonia Stevenson.

Harrison double-teamed Cummings, a Miss Basketball candidate averaging 18.3 points, fronting her with a guard and putting either Amy Jenkins or Kerstin Andrzejewski between her and the basket. Cummings was limited to 10 fieldgoal attempts. She made four (one in the second half) and was 3-of-3 shooting free throws.

"Early in the first half, she got loose for a couple of easy baskets," Manryla said, "but over the last three quarters I don't think she had a solid look without at least a couple kids on her.


In one game, Shaleb also surpassed his rushing total for all of last season when he had 239 yards on 44 attempts.
