
Farmington and Farmington Hills voters came in strong num-bers and left few surprises at the polls Tuesday. The turnout in both cities was

Wolf enpired 64 percent of the vote in Farmington and Farming-ton Hills to claim his fifth two-year term as 19th District Oakland County Commissioner in Tues-day's general election.

OAKLAND COUNTY COMMISSION

The Republican incumbent col-lected 10,492 votes in both cities compared to 6,032 for Democratic challenger Kurt Lopez. In 1994, Wolf also defeated Lopez. The 19th District includes Farmington and a southern por-tion of Farmington Hills and a
