

# Granddaughter of pioneers dead at 89

Winifred Beth Otis, a Farmington resident and granddaughter of Farmington-area pioneer Isrnel Leet, died Oct. 31 at Botsford Hospital, Farmington Hills. She was 89.

Born in Farmington Township on Oct. 17, 1907, Mrs. Otis was co-owner of Howard Otis Sales and Sorvices, an auto dealership located for many years at Grand River and Grove in Farmington. She was a member of Salem United Church of Christ for 30 years.

Mrs. Otis' grandfather, Israel Lect, was three years old in 1830 when his family came by ox cart from Orange County, N.Y. to a land-grant farm at 13 Mile and Middlobelt. His parents were David and Amelia Lect. The farm extended from Middlobelt Road west to about where the Glen Oaks Country Club is today.

Israel Leet taught school in Farmington Township and was a school inspector for many years. Israel married Betsy Madden, who lived on a farm at 15 Mile and Middlebelt. They had three children: George, who was Mrs. Otis' father, Blanche and Minah. George married Inex Higby. Their children were Winifred, Verna and Clyde.

The oxen yoke that was used to pull the wagon from New York to Farmington was preserved by the family and hangs over the fireplace at the Otis home in Farmington. Another treasure from the past was the school bell that Israel Leet used to call the children to class.

"She (Mrs. Otis) was a kind person with a wonderful sense of humor," said Phyllis Spetys, a longtime friend.
