The cost is \$25 for all three seasions. (Spaces are limited so register early to ensure a spot.)



Hawks rally to win regional



Farmington Harrison spotted Trenton a 14-0 lead Saturday in a Class A playoff game, then rallied for a 35-21 victory. The Hawks will play Grosse Pointe North in the state semifinals this week.

If the mark of a championship football team is its ability to deal with adversity, then Farmington Harrison has to be feeling good about its chances in the Class A

The Hawks rallied from a two-touchdown deficit Saturday to defeat host Trenton, 35-21, and win their 13th regional championship in 14 chances since the state playoffs were first expanded to eight tennis.

"If this was a prize fight, they kept jabbing and jabbing, and we could never get off the ropes," Trenton coach Bob Czarnecki said. "Today they were the better football team, and they proved it."

The Hawks (10-1) will play Grosse Pointe North in a semifinal game at 1:30 p.m. Saturday. The site was still to be determined.

After spotting the Trojans a 14-0 lead in the first quarter, Harrison came back to force a haltime tie but also had to overcome a seven-point

deficit early in the second half.
Senior quarterback Kevin Bambenek mixed the pass with the run as Harrison outgained Trenton 240-138 on the ground and 130-119 through the air.
Bambenek and senior fullback Nick Shaieb scored two touchdowns each and senior tailback Sean Sarsfield one.

Shaieb had scoring runs of 2 and 16 yards, Bambenek 1 and 8. Sars-field, the leading rusher with 77 yards on 17 carries, scored from 2

"We came together as a team and all did our jobs," Sarsfield said. "We just did what we know we could do. "We know we can drive the ball on anybody. With our grubbers, I think

we have possibly the toughest line in the state. I'd trust those guys against anybody; they were just deing what they normally do."
The Hawks were recelling at the start as the Trojans (9-2) blocked a Harrison punt and stopped the Hawks on fourth-and-1 at midfield. Trenton drove 30 (five plays) and 55 yards (eight plays) to score on its first two possessions.
