Michigan State University got a two-for-one deal Wednesday when Wayne Memorial's Lorenzo Guess announced he will play football and basketball for the Spartans.

The 6-60-52, 188-pound Guess made a verbal commitment Wednesday morning before n gathering of teammates, fellow students, family and concles at the school's auditorium.

The big surprise is that Guess, who has thrown for more than 4,000 yards as a quarterback and scored over 1,000 points as a point guard, will sign a national letter-of-intent in football in February.

The early signing period for basketball ended yesterday, Basketball letters-of-intent cannot be signed again until February.

Guess had MSU and Michigan caps planted on the podium before announcing his decision.

"I decided to commit now, so there wouldn't be as much pressure for the basketball scanen," said Guess, who led Wayno to a 23-3 record and a berth in the Class A state semifinals in East Lansing a year ago. "I feel good about going there. I just had a feelige canch (Tom) Izzo this morning, and I talked with (football) coach (Nick) Saban (the football coach) last night. I didn't get to sleep until around midnight.
