Senior fullback Nick Shaieb has rushed for 764 yards and \$2 touchdowns, and senior Seña Sarsfield is the leading rusher among the tailbacks with 356 yards and three TDs.

"I think our offensive line is very good and able to pick up just about any kind of defense is sees," Herrington said. "They give us a good chance at the point of attack, and then it's up to the backs to get through the hole, hang on to the ball and keep the chains moving.
"Sarsfield has given us a boost at tailback after he recovered from the broken wrist. Shaleb and Bambenek have been key players all year."
