"We're being as rate conscious as we can, but understanding the fact when you add 17 new channels to your system, those things cost money," said Bob McCann, general manager of Time Warner is allowed to increase rates \$1 a month as well as for inflation and external costs, according to a social contract the company has with the Federal Communications Commission.

New programming alone is costing Time Warner \$1 more per customer, McCann said. Cable subscriber rates are still below the maximum allowed under FCC rules, he added. Broadcast basic—the tior that includes municipal channels and TV networks—is \$1.34 below the allowable rate cable companies can charge.

"I just find it incredible," said Southwestern Oakland Cable Commission member and

A planned increase has one Farmington Hills resident poring over the social contract between Time Warner and the FCC, though. "I'm just trying to look out for the customers out there," said Torkild Nielsen, who attended the SWOCC meeting Nov. 19 when the rate increases were announced.

The social contract is the result of an agreement that was reached before Time Warner merged with MetroVision last year, Nielsen said, Michigan is not listed and shouldn't be subjected to rate increases as a result of contract. "That's a good question for the FCC," said Caren Collins, executive director of SWOCC. It was a universal agreement between Time Warner and the FCC that has impacted all Time Warner franchies."

National Association of Telecommunication Officers and Advisors — which SWOCC is a member — has filed suit over the social contract, Collins said.
