"To keep him in remission the best chance is for a bone marrow transplant," said his mather, Janine, during a news conference last week at the Beverly Hills Racquet Club.

It was held to dram up support for a massive area blood and bone marrow drive spearheaded by the Phoebe Foundation of Beverly Hills, in coaperation with the J.P. McCarthy Foundation of Bloomfield Hills, the Southfield-based Karmanos Cancer Institute and the Southeastern Michigan Chapter of the American Red Cross.

Chris' discosses, which is usually fatal, was diagnosed Nov. 30, 1992, but through drugs and chemotherapy, it went in remission for four years, his mother said, "then relapsed Oct. 17. But now, it's in mission again."

He was off medication for nine months when the relapse hit,



she said. The cancer had only been found in his bone marrow before, but suddenly it was spot-ted in Chris' spinal fluid. "Now it's a whole new ball game," said Janine, who asked that her last name not be used. Chris' father, also numed

Chris, said his son has been so sapped by his illness he barely get out of bed for two weeks.
"His mind is sharp, but his body is not willing," the senior Chris said.

"Christopher hasn't gone back to school yet," his muther said, "so they have been sending him tapes of what they've been doing, like their Halloween party, and they even went Trick or Treating for him.
