Falcons have positive outlook

If his team's performance matches coach Denny Mikel's optimism, Farmington High will be successful in the 1996-97 boys basketball sea-

son.

Mikel can't predict how successful, but he is certain of this much: The Falcons will be improved over recent

years.
Farmington had a 4-17 record last season (3-8 in the Western Lakes Activities Association) following a 2-19 finish the previous year.
A combination of returning players and new talent has Mikel com-

paring his team to the 1993-94 squad that finished second in the WLAA and won a district champi-

WLAA and won a district championship.
"Obviously, we had a couple down seasons, and this one I think is going to turn it around for us," Mikel said. "I see a lot of similarities between this team and the '94 group that just wouldn't quit. I see a lot of the same intensity and desire that group had."
The voteran players are seniors Nick Sertic, Todd Afflerbaugh and Adam Weber, and juniors Ron Freeman and Trevor Gaines finished last season on the varsity.

Senior Tony Juncaj and junior David Viane are newcomers who are expected to have an immediate impact. The roster includes juniors Matt Orr, Ryan Gargol, Bryant Bronner and freshman Justin Milus. "I'm excited about my team," Mikel said. "We have a great attitude and a good starting five. I don't feel we have any weaknesses."

Sertic (6-5, 170) is the top returning scorer, avoraging eight points and 2½ rebounds last scason. He will play on the wing primarily but has expanded his overall game.

"One of his goals is to be a better inside player, rebounder and everything." Mikel said. "He worked on his game a lot in the summer and is probably our best shooter.

"He also developed a game where he can take it to the basket now. Teams will have to play him a little more honestly, because they knew

he was mainly an outside shooter last year.

"Wo're looking for good things from Nick, and he'd like the opportunity to play after high school; so he knows he has to have a pretty good season."

Weber (6-4, 200) missed the entire football season with mononucleosis but is fully recovered. He averaged 4½, points and will complement Gaines in he post.

"He's been very eager to get started with basketball," Mikel said: "He's been working very hard ever since he get the green light to go shead and practice, and he wants to have a good senior year."

Gaines (6-5, 190) played in eight varsity games, averaging five points and 5½ rebounds, but could surprise a lot of opposing teams who didn't see him play or don't remember him.
