Ladies of Charity feed hundreds in county

Twenty-eight years ogo, Kny Browne accompanied her moth-er to a Ladies of Charity of St. Viacent De Paul meeting. Today she is a member of the charity's national board of directors.

charity's national board of directors. Browne became a member of the charity organization the same year the group started their Annual Christmas Pro-ject. This year, that project is expected to provide some 250 food and tay baskets to over 1,000 needy Oakland County residents. Giving to others is not some thing Browne, a Bloomfield Hills resident, ever questioned. Her parents, now decensed, had always been giving people, involved in helping the commu-nity.

"I think that's really how you celebrate Christ's birthday," Browne said, "We're in it because we know it's the right thing to do." Her mother, Blanche Byer-tein, a nursing school graduate, raised 7 chidren while working full-time and still found time to be a member of the Ladies of Charity of St. Vincent De Paul in Detroit.

One of the things Byeclein used to do was dress her chil-dren up for the holidays and bring them to area nursing homes "so that we would get acquainted with what it was to take care of people." Browne said. Nearly 100 volunteers are expected to gather at St. Hugo of the Hills Pariah Social Hall in Bloomfield Hills Dec. 11 and

12 to fill food baskets for needy Oakland County families. The Oakland County Chapter will deliver food baskets with the help of volunteers Friday and Saturday, Dec. 13 and 14 to a group of individuals whose names were provided through social service agencies. Ladies of Charity of St. Vin-cent De Paul is spending 520,000 on food and 55.000 in toys for the baskets. "We're acking for monetary donations to help defray our costs for this project," Ladies of Charity member Marianne McBrearty said. Browne was part of the small movement to start a Ladies of Charity chapter in Oakland County. That effort grow from local women storing food and clothing in their basements for the needy to a 350-member organization which has a clothes closet and food pantry at St. Hugo. at St. Hugo.

Recently, the Detroit and Oakland County associations merged.

"We (help) as much as 40 to 50 families a week," Browne said, adding that the Ladies of Charity has a nationwide mem-bership of 15,000.

"It's the oldest Catholic orga-nization in the world," Browne said, adding that any woman, no matter their religion, is wel-come to join the group for an annual fee of \$10. "We want members, but we want mem-bers to be active. There are nine Oakland County agencies that ask for our help."

The charity organization helps the community year round through many events in addition to the food pantry and clothes closet, where domations can be made from 8:30 a.m. to 2 p.m. Tuesdays. Other services provided by the charity include

visits to elderly members, birth-day parties for children at the Sarah Fisher Center, working in the St. Vincent'De Paul soup kitchen in Pontiac, making blankets for the poor and more.

"We just try and help out when we can," McBrearty said. "We try and fill their need."

"To the Ladies of Charity, Christmas is everyday and every week," Browne added, referring to clothes closest vol-unteers Mary Weinand and Mariam Best. "I wish the same enthusiasem would be three in the month of March."

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
