Sometimes, a 40-minute art class has dwindled to 30 minutes, Smith said.

Portable classrooms are isolated, making it difficult for integrated study of music or art with other subjects.

Safety is a constant concern too, Smith said.

Fire Dept. urges check of smoke detectors


Farmington Hills Fire Department officials are urging apartment-dwellers to check their smoke detectors, after a fire Saturday at the Independence Green Apartments.

Firefighters responded to the fire at 6:42 p.m. and put out a fire in a living room of an apart-ment at the complex, off Halsted and north of 10 mile.

The fire, which involved a building with four units on the Kinley, caused \$18,000 in lamage to contents and \$6,000 n structural damage.
