

The expanded basic tier (channels 22-61) now has 17 more channels than it used to, and the remainder of the added channels fall under premium services and pay-perview.

When expanding their channels, Time Warner also completed theiroriginal franchise commitment by providing Channel 15 to the cityof Farmington (previously Farmington and Farmington Hills sharedchannel 8).

So, you can now see programming from the cities of Farmington, Farmington Hills and Novi, each on its own channel.

In our franchise contract with Time Warner, the cities made provisions for Public, Educational and Governmental access channels. This means that local programming is available to you and you have a say in what you see on cable TV.

But SWOCC hasjurisdiction only over the access channels, not any other channelson the Time Warner cable system.

It's basically a First Amend-mentissue that keeps the local government's hands out of the programsthat Time Warner offers.

Time Warner has informed the commissionthat programs they choose are a business deci-sion based onviewership.

We believe that public opinion plays an important part in business decisions so SWOCC has responded to your feedback and placed aformal request to Time Warner to bring CICO back on the channel line-up through a metion at our Dec. 17, 1996 pubmetion at our Dec. 17, 1996 pubmetical pubmeti

Although we have no formal recourse if they don't, we will continue to act on your behalf within the authority vested in us by the FCC.


