Farmington Elks Lodge No. 1986 sponsored three boys and three girls in the district contest in which youths from area lodges competed in free-throw shooting.


Lindsey Scher, Kristen Kluka, Gayle Terenes and Andrew Rousos also represented Farmington in the district event.
