

# Sosnowski paces C'ville club team with 4 victories

Nick Sosnowski captured four open events recently for the host Clarenceville Swim Club in the first annual Sheila Taormina Gold Medal Classic age-group meet.

Sosnowski, 16, finished first in the 200-yard freestyle (1:53.29), 100 backstroke (1:00.02), 200 individual medley (2:10.8) and 200 backstroke (2:09.82).

tops in kill efficiency with four in as many attacks.

Nicole Vondracek served two aces and led Ladywood in serving, receiving and setting efficiency. She had seven assists out of 10 sets.

Sarah Pogits played a good all-round match with two blocks, two kills, six assists and one ace.

In addition, Cathy Hermann served two aces; Kristen Dause had three blocks; Mary Lu Hemme had five digs and Katie Brogan four.

"I was pleased with Mary Lu's performance, blocking and receiving serves," Teeters said. "She's being more aggressive, and that's making a difference on broken plays and free balls. The three aces (Dause, Hermann and Vondracek) are contributing heavily in all areas."

"Sarah Pogits is becoming much more versatile. Her defense has improved greatly, but she's also contributing as a blocker and on the second-ball attack, which is keeping teams off balance."

The Marlins didn't play at the level they have in other matches, according to coach Peggy Spengler.

"The only positive thing is Ladywood didn't see Mercy tonight," she said. "We had very few attacks and we passed the ball into the net, and those are things we don't normally do."

"The things I've seen this team execute consistently, like serve receive, we didn't see tonight. So

when we see them again, hopefully, it will be a different game."

The teams will play again at Ladywood on Thursday, Feb. 6.

Mercy students spent the first part of the week taking final exams, which might have left the Marlins too stressed to play well in a big match against a good team like Ladywood, she added.

"To play a team like Ladywood, you need a lot of emotion, and anyone who saw the match could see Mercy didn't play with emotion," Spengler said.

"Final exams take a lot of emotion; there's a lot of stress and it takes its toll. But that shouldn't be an excuse, and it's not an excuse."

Senior outside hitter Gail Agacinski had five kills and 10 attacks. Erin Fitzgerald (two kills/two spikes) was the leading passer. Kathy August had no setting errors and also had two kills.

The Marlins travel to East Kentwood for an 18-team tournament Saturday involving many of the best teams in West Michigan.

"We're certainly capable of better than 5 and 3," Spengler said. "Ladywood is one of the top teams in the league, but we could have done better than that — and we will."

"I'm not worried this is a sign of things to come. We'll deal with it in practice and get ready to play Bishop Foley on Thursday."

**Falcons in Final Four**

Farmington High advanced to the semifinals of the Plymouth Salem Invitational in a performance that pleased coach Julie Ingalls.

In pool play Saturday, the Falcons defeated Garden City (15-9, 15-8), split with Romulus (8-15, 15-8), defeated Dearborn Heights Crestwood (15-3, 15-13) and lost to host Plymouth Salem (8-15, 8-15).

Plymouth Canton eliminated Farmington in the semifinals, 6-15, 13-15.

"This was the first tournament this year that we got to the semis," Ingalls said. "It was by far our best performance of the year."

Kari Heist served 28 points, including 15 aces, in the first three pool-play matches. She served 16 points (seven aces) against Garden City.

Sarah Mikel served nine points and matched Heist's four aces in the Crestwood contest.

Emily Engelmann was outstanding as a blocker throughout the tournament, according to Ingalls, and Jennifer Neale spearheaded the defense for the Falcons.

On Monday, Farmington dropped to 0-4 in the Western Lakes Activities Association with a loss to visiting Walled Lake Central, 15-9, 15-2, 15-8.

"We basically were on defense all night," Ingalls said. "We made adjustments. We were trying to catch up all night."

## Rocks keep win streak intact

Put another chapter in the book of classic Livonia Churchill-Plymouth Salem volleyball matches.

Salem's Western Lakes Activities Association streak is still alive, but if you look closely at tonight's "EFT" television episode you'll notice it spent the first 30 minutes in the trauma room.

Churchill took the first two games of their Monday night match, 16-14 and 15-11 as Salem looked out of sync.

But the Rocks, behind sophomore Laine Sterling's serving and setting, rallied for a 15-6 third-game win and came to life in the last two for 15-9 and 15-3 wins to extend its WLAA winning streak to 37 matches.

"We're like Tina Turner," Salem assistant coach Allie Sufiga said. "We like to do things the hard way."

"The same thing happened here last year," Salem coach Brian Gilles said. "They won the first two games and we won the next three."

"It just seemed like the players kind of disappeared. There was nobody stepping up. Nobody was having a good game."

"But then it seemed like we picked it up. This was a big victory for us. We have so many

young players. This will help them mature."

Salem improved to 19-4-4 overall, 3-0 in the WLAA and remained 2-0 in the Lakes Division. Churchill is now 13-3 overall, 2-1 in the WLAA and 2-0 in the Western Division.

The Chargers were led by setter Karl Buzewski, who repeatedly hung the ball up for Megan McGinty, Amanda Eszes and Lori Leszczynski to bash.

McGinty had, unofficially, 17 kills in the five games. Eszes had nine and Leszczynski six. "We played them three times last year," Churchill coach Mike Hughes said. "We won the first two games at their place, then lost the next three."

"We knocked them out of the conference tournament, 2-1. It's a very competitive rivalry."

Salem hasn't lost a WLAA regular-season match since 1993. Guess who did it?

"Churchill might be a nice guess."

"We lost two matches in 1993," Gilles said. "And we won the first two games in both of them."

"Mike Hughes is a heckuva coach. They always play awesome defense. The last ball of the game, they had five kids chasing

it down."

The third game was tied, 2-2, when Sterling was sent in to serve for Salem. The Rocks won two points on errors, got a kill by Jenny Trott that Sterling set up and then scored two more on unreturned serves to jump out to a 7-2 lead.

It was 9-2 before the Chargers rallied for four straight points behind Jessica Sherman's serve but Kristi Giddings served out the game.

Hughes praised Buzewski more than half the game in an effort to freshen her up for the last two.

"We didn't pass very well the last couple of games," he said. "And if you can't get the ball to your setter, your setter can't get the ball to your hitters."

"We didn't serve well that last game, either. They didn't make any service errors and we made four."

"Their basic skills are just better than ours."

Amanda Abraham led Salem with 14 kills, 16 blocks and two shared blocks. Trott had 11 kills. Sterling was the spark. She had 15 assists.

"Our other setter, Jenny Matthews, got hurt," Gilles said. "So we brought Laine up from the junior varsity. She played so well we couldn't send her down."
