"We tend to locate ourselves in upscale suburban communities where there's high-traffic shopping and a residential community so that we can apply to both day parts — the shopper during line day or the businessperson who wants to grab a quick lunch, and a family that wants to get a bite to eat. It's a great place to take your family, said Saruh A. Goldsmith, vice president of public relations and advertising. CPK has been open for four months offering 27 different kinds of pizzas on standard dough or honey-wheat dough. The pizzas are "wood-fired," meaning they are cooked for

approximately three minutes in wood-burning stoves. Taking vegctarians and those with food allergies into consideration, any of the pizzas may be ordered cheesless or meatless. Individual pizzas range from the traditional (five-cheess and tomato, vegetarian, traditional choese, and fresh tomato) to more daring choices (Thai chick-en, tandoori chicken, tostand-pizza, and griled burrit pizzas). "We have something for every-one," Flax said. "Even the traditionalist will find a sausage and popperon jizza, while vegetarians and those who have dietary restrictions can choose from


