Chief: Efforts curb drunken driving

An effort to stem the tide of increased drunken driving is paying off, according to Farmington Hills police Chief Bill Dwyer.

The Parmington Hills police, along with Southfield, Novi, Royal Oak, Waterford, the Oakland County Sheriff's Department, and the Michigan State Police in Northville and Pontiac took part in a grant-funded onforcement effort over the Thanksgiving Christmas New Years holiday targeting drunk drivers.


More recently, there may have been a drop off in concern by motorists, he said.
