POLICE AND FIRE CALLS

Listed below are some of the
Farmington-area police incidents,
fire calls and court cases
reported during the past week.

FIRES

In Farmington Hills:
Firefighters from Station 1 put
out a fire in a 1992 Chevy Blazer
on eastbound I-496 in Farmington
at 4:24 p.m. Jan. 31. The fire
had started in the engine compartment
and spread into the passenger
compartment, causing
\$12,500 in damage.

Firefighters from Station 1
responded to a small fire burning
in a chair cushion in the
basement of a home on Stableview
at 6:06 p.m. Feb. 3. Firefighters
found evidence of smoking
including three ashtrays and
discarded cigarettes and ashes.

The homeowner, 42, had fallen
asleep at about 5 p.m. to get
ready for her night job. Her son,
15, woke her up and told her that
there was a fire in the basement.
She saw the smoke and
called the fire department. The
boy told firefighters that he and
two friends were smoking in the
basement and an ash fell off,
starting the fire in the chair.
Damage to the house is estimated
at \$1,000 and damage to contents
was \$5,000.

FIRE DEPARTMENT RUNS

Farmington Hills firefighters
made 86 runs for the week of
Jan. 27 to Feb. 2 including 65
medical runs (72 percent), eight
citizen assists and four fires.

SMOKING

In Farmington Hills:
Police cited a Hills girl, 15, for
her second violation of possession
of cigarettes at Duncel
Middle School on 12 Mile Jan. 29.

Police cited a Hills boy, 17, for
possession of cigarettes and
smoking on school property at
North Farmington High on 13
Mile Jan. 30.

THEFT

In Farmington Hills:

BREAK-INS

In Farmington Hills:

DRUNKEN DRIVING

alcohol level of .15 percent. A
level of .1 percent is considered
too drunk to drive in Michigan.

Ford Aerostar west on 10 Mile at
Grand River at 11:32 p.m. Feb. 1
while drunk. The van was tail-
gating a car. The driver had a
blood alcohol level of .2 percent.
Police arrested a Southfield

man, 19, for driving a red 1989
Ford Thunderbird east on Shi-
awassee at Middlebelt at 2:46
a.m. Feb. 2 while drunk. The car
swerved over the center line.
The driver had a blood alcohol
level of .06 percent. A level of .01
percent is considered too drunk
to drive in Michigan for anyone
under the age of 21.

IN FARMINGTON

Police arrested Rochester Hills
man, 34, for drunken driving on
Orchard Lake and Leelanau at
1:12 a.m. Feb. 1. Police stopped
the vehicle after it crossed the
median twice. The driver had a
blood alcohol level of .15 percent.

threatening phone calls from the
woman. Her tires were slashed
as well. On Jan. 31, a black man
who called himself "Marquis"
called threatening to sexually
assault her and "cut her up." The
call was traced to the residence
of the woman she had fired.
