

Shamrocks won't settle for tie with Trojans, 5-3

Detroit Catholic Central and Trenton were tied at 3 again Wednesday night, but this time the stalemate lasted only 31 seconds.

CC senior winger Nick Lewarne saw to that.

Lewarne scored two straight goals in the third period to break the tie and give the Shamrocks a 5-3 hockey victory over the Trojans before a sellout crowd at Trenton's Kennedy Arena.

The two state powers played to a 3-3 deadlock on Jan. 18 at Redford Arena.

Trenton, which fell behind 2-0 in the first five minutes Wednesday, tied the score at 3 when Jeremy Giles scored at 1:22 of the third period.

Before the Trenton cheering section could finish celebrating, Lewarne raced down the left wing and buried a wrist shot into the upper corner of the net later to put CC up for good, 4-3.

Lewarne added an insurance goal 4:18 later, scoring on a rebound off a shot by linemate Dan McEllan.

"I just shot it as hard as I could, put it toward the net," Lewarne said of his game-winning shot. "It was a lucky shot. Our line (including Tim Cibor) worked awesome, worked a lot in the corners, banged a lot. Every shift we went 100 percent."

About the only thing Lewarne does better than score and kill penalties is stay out of the penalty box.

"Nick has a very quick, deceptive shot, and he's had only one penalty all year," CC coach Gordie St. John said. "He's totally disciplined."

CC entered the week No. 1 ranked in Class A and Trenton, the defending state champion, No. 3. The Shamrocks moved to 17-1-1 overall and 1½ games ahead of Trenton in the Michigan Metro Hockey League at 12-0-1.

Trenton fell to 12-2-3 overall and 10-1-2 in the Metro, losing for the first time in its building in 3½ years.

"We challenged them and said 'At this point, boys, it's your team. Take control of it now,'" St. John said. "All came out focused and we had added incentive to play here."

Ian Devlin was involved in some controversy in front of the Trenton net with only 14 seconds remaining.

Devlin and Trenton goalie K.C. Begeman received penalties for roughing and CC's Jim Melton was given a game misconduct for being the third man in.

Trenton's Kurt Garza received a roughing penalty against CC goalie Rickey Marnon earlier in the third period, but Trenton coach Mike Turner didn't think Devlin took a run at his goalie in retaliation.

"Our guy didn't run their goalie and I don't think they ran ours," Turner said.

"They pushed me into the goalie, and I was just protecting myself," Devlin said.

Fire wins Extravaganza title

The Green Bay Packers weren't the only champions crowned on Super Bowl Sunday.

The Farmington Hills Fire Mite-A hockey team won the Sports Weekend Extravaganza A-AA tournament on Jan. 26.

The Fire posted a 3-0-1 tournament record, beginning with a come-from-behind, 2-1 victory over the Melvindale Lightning.

R.J. Hamilton tied the score with an assist from Shayne Perkovich at 5:15 in the third period. Two minutes later Hamilton picked up a loose puck at center ice and fired the game-winning shot into the blue line.

Goals by Mark Burns, Perkovich and Jack Malone gave the Fire a 3-0 lead against the Berkley Bears, and the team held on for a 3-2 victory.

In its next game, the Fire rallied from a 2-0 deficit to tie the unbeaten Shaker Heights (Ohio) Raiders, 2-2.

Perkovich and Malone scored the goals that sent the Fire into the final and a rematch with the Raiders.

The Fire prevailed again, 3-2. Burns gave the Fire the initial lead and scored the third goal. Mike Wasko broke a 1-1 tie late in the second period.

Fire goalie Jason Spencer, who had a 1.75 goals-against average, was named the tournament's most valuable player.

The Fire finished the Little Caesars Amateur Hockey League season with an 8-7-1 record. The tournament results boosted the team's overall record to 16-11-2.

NOTICE OF LAST DAY OF REGISTRATION OF THE QUALIFIED ELECTORS

TO THE QUALIFIED ELECTORS OF THE SCHOOL DISTRICT:
PLEASE TAKE NOTICE that a special election for Farmington Public School District will be held in the School District on Tuesday, March 25, 1997.

Act 454, Public Acts of Michigan, 1976, as amended, provides in part that the inspectors of election at an annual or special election shall not receive the vote of a person residing in a registration school district whose name is not registered as an elector in the city or township in which the person resides.

The last day for receiving registrations for the special election will be Monday, February 24, 1997. Persons registering after the Clerk's office closes, on Monday, February 24, 1997, will not be eligible to vote at the special election. Persons planning to register must determine when the Clerk's office will be open for registration.

Only persons who have registered as general electors with the appropriate Clerk of the City or Township in which they reside, or through registration at a Secretary of State driver's license bureau or at certain School District buildings, are registered school electors.

Absentee ballot applications will be available at the Lewis Schulman Administrative Center, 32000 Shawwasee, Farmington during the weekdays beginning Tuesday, March 4, 1997 through Friday March 21, 1997. The Administrative Center will also be open for absentee voting on Saturday, March 22, 1997 from 10:00 A.M. until 2:00 P.M.

The following proposals will be submitted to the electors at the special election on Tuesday, March 25, 1997:

MILLAGE RENEWAL PROPOSAL

This millage would allow the renewal of the mills previously levied by the Board of Education of the Farmington Public School District for general operating purposes which expires with the District's 1997 tax levy. Under this proposal, the District would be allowed to levy the number of mills which would enable the District to receive revenues at the full foundation allowance permitted by the State.

As a renewal of previously approved authorization which expires with the 1997 tax levy, shall the limitation on the tax upon taxable property in the Farmington Public School District, County of Oakland, Michigan be increased by 5.9166 mills (\$5.9166 per \$1,000 of taxable value) for four (4) years, the years 1998 to 2001, inclusive, to provide funds for operating expenses of the Farmington Public School District? Of the 5.9166 mills, no more than 1.7603 (\$1.7603 per \$1,000 of taxable value) would be permitted under existing law to be levied on homesteaded and qualified agricultural property. If approved, this millage would raise an estimated \$9,545,000 for the District in 1998.

BOND PROPOSAL

Shall the Farmington Public School District, County of Oakland, Michigan borrow the principal sum of not to exceed One Hundred Ten Million Dollars (\$110,000,000) and issue its general obligation unlimited tax bonds therefor for the purpose of defraying the cost of:

- erecting, furnishing and equipping additions to school buildings;
- partially remodeling, refurbishing, equipping and reequipping of existing school buildings;
- equipping and refurbishing school buildings for technology; and
- improving and developing sites in the School District?

(Under State law, bond proceeds may not be used to pay teacher or administrator salaries, routine maintenance or repair costs or other School District operating expenses.)
