## To be well schooled is to be literate

Twenty three across on The New York Times crossword puzzle was eight letters long. With no "down" letters yet filled in, Ihad only the clue "well schooled" to work with. Trained" was too short, but "educated" fit perfectly. With some hesitation, I penciled that in. Soon the "down" letters began to collide with "educated." The third letter was a "t, "the seventh another "t", the fifth an "r" until "educated" was replaced by "literate."

To be well schooled is to be literate. Of course, literacy is not confined to proficiency in the English Language Arts; science literacy, math literacy, music, world language, and computer literacy, nowever, we will look at literacy in the English Language Arts, considering the impact of both the school and the home on the literacy of our children.

First, students must learn to read, and that is the number one priority of English Language Arts instruction. This is accomplished in Farmington by using a two pronged system that addresses both reading skills and content. The saying that "we learn to read so that we can read to learn" is not in practice as linear as it sounds; the process of learning to read is entwined with learning as we read. A blended phonics whole language approach, the teaching approach used in Farmington which consists of direct instructional strategies, delivered deliberately and sequentially and enriched by quality authentic literature, scoops more children into the reading circle than any single approach. Administrators hope to raise \$150,000 for educational expenses at the private, Catholic college preparatory high school for young women, located at Eleven Mile and Middlebelt roads.


Tuition is \$5,300 this year for the 870 students. Proceeds from the auction will be used to offset the additional cost per student of providing an education.
