Defense carries CC in tourney

Brian Teeley played defensive end on the Detroit Catholic Central football team and he probably never dreamed of taking Greg Alcala's job at tailback.

As a member of the CC basketball team, Teeley is usually just as far from his train of thought.

But Teeley's willingness to take on a new role helped the Shamrocks beat Detroit St. Martin DePorres, 71-59, in a first-round Catholic League playoff game on Saturday at University of Detroit-Mercy's Calhoun Hall.

With 6-foot-10 junior center Chris Young suffering a broken nose late in the first half, the 6-3 Teeley became another offensive option in the low post for the Shamrocks. He scored nine points, making four of five shots from the floor, while grabbing a team-high 10 rebounds.

The Shamrocks expect to have Young back in the lineup — with a protective mask — for a second-round game at 7:30 p.m. Thursday against Orchard Lake St. Mary's at Schoolcraft College.

But Teeley will come prepared. "It was fun," Teeley said. "I just kept doing what I had to do."

—hustle, get rebounds, outlet the ball and get it up and score."

It was pretty versatile performance for a guy just hoping to make the team this year.

Teeley played on the junior varsity basketball team as a sophomore, but didn't play last winter. He's become, dare we say it, a gym rat.

"I started out just to keep in shape," he said. "I'm having fun now. I love to play."

Teeley was one of many unsung heroes for the Shamrocks. Also recording a career high in points was senior guard Matt Martinez, who scored 18 points on seven for 14 shooting.

Senior guard Marc McDonald overcame a slow start to finish with a game-high 23 points and sophomore guard Nick Moore showed the poise of a senior. He scored 10 of his 12 points after halftime, making five of six free throws in the fourth quarter.

Senior guard Joe Janowski made only four points, but played the entire 32 minutes along with McDonald.

The Shamrocks jumped to an 11-2 lead to start the game but a 7-0 DePorres run and injury to Young late in the second quarter left them feeling rather helpless.

CC trailed 26-23 when Young left the game with 2:57 remaining in the first half after taking an elbow and forearm in the nose while battling for a rebound. He had scored six points and grabbed two rebounds in front of University of Michigan coach Steve Fisher before the injury.

The Shamrocks, 11-6 overall, went into halftime trailing 30-27.

"I told them 'You've got to believe we can win it, go out and play,'" Coratti said. "Teeley went to Young's spot and we were a little more deliberate on offense. Brian has been a pleasant surprise. We tell him he's just got to rebound, whatever else he gets to do. He got a lot of gravity tonight."

The Shamrocks ended the third quarter on an 8-3 run to take the lead for good, 47-45. Martinez's driving bank shot from the wing just beat the buzzer to give the Shamrocks their two-point advantage.

"I was going to shoot a three, but he was playing me tight so I just decided to go around him," said Martinez, also sporting a shiner below his left eye after the game. "When I saw the shot I took it. I knew it was going in and at that point the momentum changed."

McDonald scored 18 in the second half after being held to five points on two of 10 shooting in the first half.

He finished with five baskets from three-point range, including four in the second half that seemed to be dropping from the Calhoun Hall rafters.

Only one of his baskets in the second half came in front of the arc.

"McDonald got open and once he got going it was like a snow-ball effect," said DePorres coach Derrick Owens, who wasn't pleased with the Eagles' 11 turnovers after halftime compared to CC's six. "We had too many missed opportunities in transition, too many turnovers."

Toremun Johnson, a 6-5 junior forward, led DePorres with 18 points. Senior guard Jason Smith added 11 for the Eagles, 10-7 overall.

The Oakland Community College women's basketball team prepared for Wednesday's showdown with St. Clair by downing visiting Schoolcraft College on Saturday, 65-58.

Sophomore forward Cara West poured in 24 points and dished out six assists and freshman forward Carrie May (North Farmington) added 18 as the Lady Raiders upped their Michigan Community College Athletic

Association Eastern Conference mark to 9-4.

Freshman forward Jaclyn Pilkievicz (Walled Lake Central) chipped in nine rebounds, seven assists and seven points, and Keona Smith grabbed four rebounds in 14 minutes after missing the previous three games with a knee injury.

Schoolcraft retired to a 24-13 lead, but a 16-4 run pulled OCC even and the Lady Raiders even-

tually went ahead at halftime 36-35.

The game was tied 42-42 when OCC (9-15) put together a 12-4 run during a seven-minute span, and Schoolcraft never got closer than five points the rest of the way.

Christina Harmon (Walled Lake Central) scored 13 points and dished out four assists for Schoolcraft, 18-7 overall and 9-4 in the conference.

Pilkievicz collected 13 points, 10 rebounds, four assists and three steals in 37 minutes last Wednesday to help the Lady Raiders down Macomb, 68-35.

OCC, which also received 12 points and a career-high six rebounds from Kindra Schaefer and 10 points and four assists from West, led 55-22 at halftime before holding the Monarchs to just 13 second-half points.

Freshman Martie Matthews (Walled Lake Western) chipped in six points and five rebounds — both career highs. Karen Kerr had a career-high 11 rebounds.

Martha Ferguson topped Macomb with 12 points.

MCCAA state tournament begins Monday.

OCC (men) 77, SCHOOLCRAFT 72: The host Raiders overcame a six-point halftime deficit Saturday to push their overall and league records over the .500 mark.

Freshman forward Julius Teal, coming off a 19-point effort against Macomb, collected 28 points, 11 rebounds and four steals as OCC erased a 40-34 halftime deficit with a strong second-half performance.

OCC battled hard last Wednesday but came out on the short end of a 67-60 score at Macomb CC.

White added 13 points and five rebounds, Henry had 12 points and six rebounds, Macomb's Dorian McClure led all scorers with 24 points.

OCC scored the first six points of the second half to pull even at 30, but the Monarchs went on an 18-7 run over the next nine minutes.
