FARMINGTON WON IN 12th.

A CLOSE GAME LAST SATURDAY AFTERNOON

Pierce's Three Bagger and Steal Home Cinched the Winning Tally

Those who turned out to see the ball game last Saturday were amply rewarded for they saw a very fine, close contest. The game was a good one throughout, not a score being made after the fourth inning until the twelfth when Ed. Pierce pulled off a real Ty Cobb stunt by whaling out a three bagger and then cinching the game by stealing home. The score of 5 to 4 in favor of Farmington indicates the kind of a game the boys played.

The members of both teams were on tension all the time and the uncertainty of the outcome kept the fans in a state of intense expectancy from the 4th to the 12th inning.

Franklin furnished a team of hard hitters and fairly good fielders. Will McHugh pitched a remarkably clever game for them, and Elmer Nichols, catching, played a good second.

The Farmington line up was a little unusual, some of the regulars being out of town, but the substitutes certainly covered themselves with glory. WATER WORKS NOW THE ISSUE

City Officials Investigating the Various Modern Systems that Are Now in Use

The long deferred trip that some of the city officials had planned for the purpose of investigating water systems was finally taken Tuesday. With Howard Warner as pilot, and chief engineer they went in the Warner automobile and paid a visit to Millington and Oxford besides making a stop at Lapeer.

Those who went were Thos. H. McGee, F. M. Warner, Floyd Nichols and Ben Meyers.

At Millington, a town about the size of Farmington, they found a system that looked quite good to them. The water is taken from deep wells and pumped into a reservoir and in addition they have a compressed air system that adds to and holds the pressure in the water mains. The air had not been pumped in the tank since the
