BLOOMFIELD HILLS
Block scheduling set: Students may spend more time in some classes when block scheduling takes effect at Andever and Lasher high schools this fall. When students begin the 1997-98 school year, they will spend the same amount of time in each class weekly, although class times may run 90 minutes on some occasions and 50 minutes at other times. The longer time blocks allow for more 50 minutes at other times. The longer time blocks allow for more intense lab time and in depth atudy of topics. Students and teachers will test out the new system from April 21 to May 2.

greatest needs: Springfield
Township needs a new library,
another fire station, better park

Water for sale: Water is being offered to Oxford Area Community School District—for a price. The district, which needs a water supply for a proposed middle school at North Oxford and Ray roads, has two options: drill its own well or buy it from Oxford village. A resolution, passed by the village concil, allows water to be supplied by the village.
