The Farmington Hills resident was a Holocaust survivor, his life spared twice in separate incidents while others were killed in the notorious Auschwitz death camp. Other quirks of fate would see him through a rich and fulfilling life.

Mr. Richman died at his home April 28. He was 71.

"My father died from heart failure, which is ironic because he had so many people in his heart . . . and he touched so many different hearts," said Audrey Klayman of Commerce Township, his youngest daughter.
