Harrison senior earns All-American honors; says 'I like to be challenged'

JOR Andersen doesn't carry n football

He's scored a winning tally where

The Farmington Hills Harrison High
senior was named as one of the top 100
high school students in the subject by
the American Association of Physics
Teachers. He carned the distinction
ifter scoring well on two physics tests:
A multiple choice exam and the other a
problem solving quiz.
History was on his side, though.
Andersen follows previous Harrison
High Physics All-Americans: David
King, 1988, Morris Stutzky, 1982; Avi
Drissman, 1984; and Brendan Fay,
1996. The studious senior has that little
bit something special, a Harrison High
teacher said.
"He's awesome," said Dennis King,
larrison High physics teacher. "I'd rate
him as one of the top five intellectually
sut of the students I've had."
Another thing that sets Andersen
apart is his willingness to help teachers,
King said. He's been a teacher's assistant in King's class and for his English
class.

Andersen is also the go-to guy when

there are problems in the computer lab.

"He's very helpful to so many teachers," King said. 'I was saying to another teacher how much Jon has helped me.
The other teacher said, 'He's like that with average."

Such pitch-in spirit comes natural for the Farmington Hills teen. Andersen is involved with activities and served as youth leader at the Mormon Church of Latter Day Saints.

Academic success requires another type of devotion, Andersen said. That's why he doesn't take part in idle chit-chat or other distractions in the class-

why he desarchat or other distractions in the classroom.


"The thing that works for me is I spend every minute in school... always concentrating," Andersen said. "I always try to see the connection between things.

He was a member of the school's Tests in Engineering Aptitude in Math and Science squad that won the national championship last year. This year's TEAMS contingent captured the state title for the seventh consecutive year. He also took part in the Robo-Hawks robotties project,

in the Robo-Hawks robotics project, which was a joint venture with Harrison High students and Farmiagton Hills engineering firm TRW. The squad took rookle-of-the-year honors in the national FIRST competition at the Epcot Center.

Anderson will be working on an internship program at TRW this summer before starting at the University of Michigan in the fall. He plans to major
