

Bass anglers have short wait

Bass season opened last week and a couple local anglers wasted little time in finding a successful pattern.

Southfield's Terry Sanders and Livonia's Byrum McBride teamed with their partners to place second and fourth, respectively, Saturday in the 1997 Oakland Bass Master's Kent Lake Open.

Sanders and his partner, Terry Abfalter of Howell, caught an eight-fish tournament limit, which tipped the scale at 21.51 pounds, less than a half-pound short of the winning catch of 21.94 pounds, caught by Fred Miquirastri (Milford) and Jim Indreica (Flint). For their success Sanders and Abfalter each received a plaque and they pocketed \$925.25 in cash, \$20 in Big Boy Cash and two Gander Mountain hats.

Sanders also just missed big bass honors with his 5.16-pound largemouth. Fenton's Tom Holda

had the big bass of the tournament, 5.26-pound largemouth. McBride and his partner, Al Fazakas of Dearborn Heights, placed fourth with a catch of 17.54 pounds. They earned \$442.50 cash, \$20 in Big Boy Cash and two Gander Mountain hats.

Despite cool rainy conditions throughout a major portion of the tournament 40 two-man teams weighed fish out of the 75 teams entered in the tournament. The 40 successful teams combined to land 143 keepers which weighed a tournament-averaged 400.52 pounds. That's an average of 2.80 pounds per fish. Every fish weighed was alive and released back into the lake.

The next event on the Oakland Bass Master's schedule will be the Orchard Lake Open on June 8. There is a 60-pound limit so pre-registration is advised. For more information contact Oakland Bass Masters at 838 N. Maple, Royal Oak, MI 48067 or call (248) 542-5254.

While the bass season in Michigan is just starting, the season on the BASSMASTER

Tournament Trail has come to a close. First-year pro Kyle Greene of Bloomfield Hills had a very respectable year and ended up 50th in the Eastern Invitational point standings with 833 points. The top five in the Eastern Invitational standings receive an invitation to the prestigious BASSMASTER Classic. Greene, who had a tough outing in the final event when he placed 170th (seven fish, 13.03 pounds) in the Alabama Eastern Invitational on May 8-10, fell just 221 points shy of an invitation to the Classic.

The Michigan Department of Natural Resources has announced the top finishers in the 1997 Michigan Waterfowl Stamp design competition and several local wildlife artists placed in the top 10.

For the third time, Manistique artist Dietmar Krumrey won the competition, this year with a painting of pintails. His winning work will appear on the 1998 Michigan Waterfowl stamp.

Livonia's Ken Bardol placed second with his painting of a buffleheads and Rochester artist Larry Tucci placed third with a

painting of mallards. Paul Butala of Southfield, and Heiner Hertling of West Bloomfield, both placed in the top 10.

They'll still bowl on historic lanes

Thunderbowl Lanes in Allen Park is a familiar mecca of bowling, opening with four lanes in October 1982 for competition in the short-lived National Bowling League.

Knobs have been flying lately that George Frybyla, Thunderbowl's gregarious proprietor, was going to sell it.

He confirmed that during the All-Star Banquet at St. Mary's Cultural Center in Livonia, announcing the new owners would not be Home Depot, but Mr. and Mrs. Jim Strobl, proprietors of Royal Lanes.

George wanted to be sure the traditions established in his 66 years in bowling would be carried on for many years to come. The occasion for the announcement was during the Awards

Banquet of the Les Stanford Chevrolet Hall of Fame Classic, which bowls at Thunderbowl on Tuesdays with the Leans Traveling All-Star Classic league. Many of the same bowlers are members of both leagues.

One of the first awards was the Raymond Kowalski Memorial Award which went to Joe Paulus of West Bloomfield, an all-time great bowler and Hall of Famer who also happens to be Frybyla's partner at Thunderbowl Lanes.

The Joe Paulus Sportsman of the Year award went to Quinton Greene.

In the Traveling All-Stars, Mark More was named "Bowler of the Year" with his league-leading 225.32 average, just ahead of Canton's Ken Kossick at 222.79. "Rookie of the Year" was Mike Norris. And Chris Viney was "Rookie of the Year" in the Tuesday Les Stanford Hall of Fame Classic.

Craig Bosco led this league with a 230.10 average to be

crowned "King of Bowlers" for 1996-97.

Each individual series was a 816 by Larry Walker of Garden City.

The league champions were Anasara's Big Boy Team, with Low Anasara Captain and sponsor Tony Stupak of Redford, and Chantrelain of Auburn Hills, Ken Kossick of Canton, Todd Kurovski, Vernon Peterson of Dearborn, Steve Roberts of Wyandotte and Paul Grauzer of Westland.

League champs in the Tuesday Traveling All Stars were "SB Pro Shop Turbo 2 n U/Revit" with Jay Lang, Joe Krajcnke, Mark Moore, Kurt Pilon, Kerry Krefl, Jesse Bowersock and Chris Sand. Nick Wissinger carried high series with 817.

Between these two leagues, there is probably the most pure bowling talent to be found in any venue in the nation.

Many of these bowlers have been on the PBA tour, while others just keep ringing up more honor scores all the time.

The Les Stanford bowlers averaged 214.18 for the 1996-97 season while the Traveling All Stars carried an average of 204.26 and that was in 33 different bowling centers.

They did their best at Shorecrest Lanes where they averaged 222.33 but struggled at Cherry Hill North in Clarkston where they only averaged 196.97. It was another banner year for the All-Stars.

Ken Kossick had his share of honors to be sure, but the proverbial "chip off the old block" would be appropriate as his son, Brent, took first place in the YABA Mach Memorial Scholarship Tournament, which earned a cool \$1,000 in scholarship money.

Brent bowls on the WWTYC where he carries a 187 average and at 17 is in his senior year at Plymouth Canton High School, where he is also on the baseball team. Brent won his event the same weekend in January that his dad, Ken, was winning the GDBA Masters Tournament.
