Walled Lake trustee resigns

The hour-long commute to and from his new job was getting to be too much to take for Walled Lake Board of Education secretary Joe Miller. Thursday night,

Miller made public what he's been whispering for a few weeks: he is resigning from the school board with one year left in his term.

"It was a hard decision to make," Miller said Thursday

afternoon. "I really enjoyed being on the Walled Lake school board. It's been a rewarding experience. This is a wonderful school district."

But demands on his schedule grow tougher in April, when the 34-year-old Commerce Township resident began a job as manager of information systems with the Washtenaw Intermediate School District. Previously, Miller held a similar position with the Willow Run school district.

He subsequently tried making the one-hour drive each way, but it was "too much for me."

Miller plans on moving in August to a 1,500-square-foot home in Hartland, which is only about 30 minutes from his new office. Making the move with him will be wife, Joyce, and two sons (Josh, 10; Jeffrey, 7) who in 1986-87 attended Gilegry Elementary School in the Walled Lake district.

A residency requirement calls for school board members to reside within the district, which includes part of Farmington Hills.

Miller is departing the panel with one year remaining on the four-year term he was elected to in June 1994. His resignation takes effect on June 30; the board has until July 20 to appoint a replacement. If one is not selected by then, the job goes to the Oakland County Intermediate School District.

Applications from those interested in the one-year appointment are being accepted at the district offices. Letters of interest must be submitted to school board president Cynthia Campion, 850 Ladd Road, Bldg. D, Walled Lake, MI 48390.

According to a press release from the district, those letters must include "information as to strengths you might bring to the board, previous involvement in school and education-related groups, activities and committees; your thoughts on the educational programs and facilities offered in Walled Lake, and on education in general." The deadline to apply is 4 p.m. Monday, June 30.

Miller could not pinpoint any particular highlight of his three-year board stint. But he did say he gained valuable insight into how school districts provide education to the public.

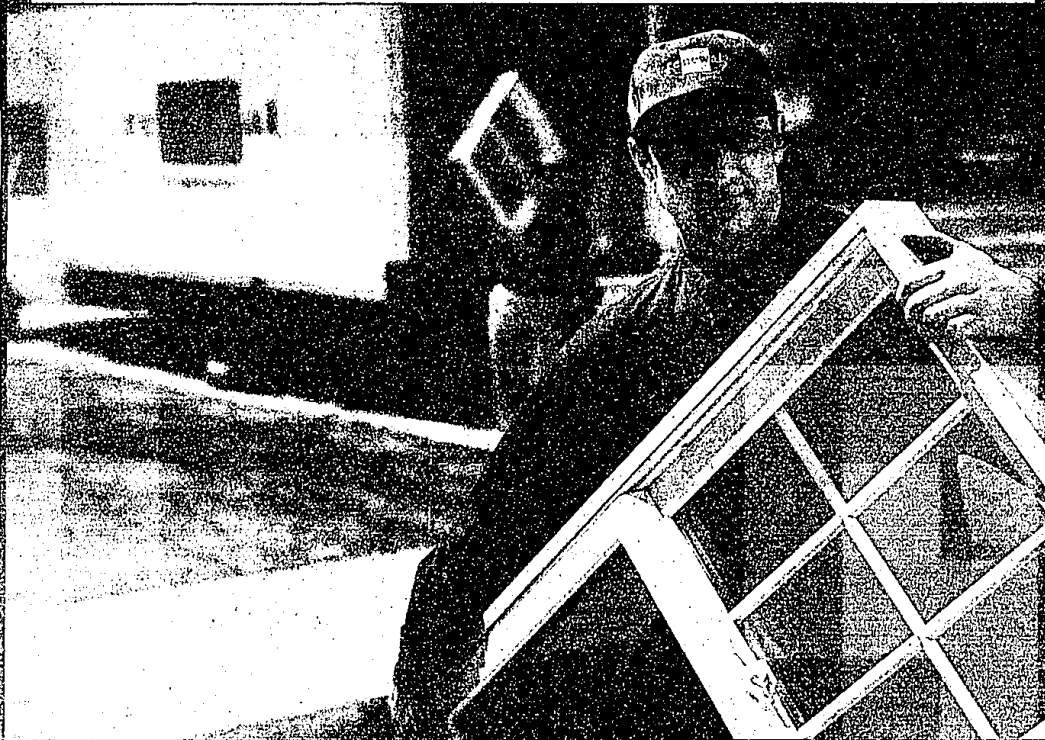
As for his replacement, one former school board member who won't be applying is one-time appointee David Flammer, who was named in 1989 to replace trustee William Knight. He served until 1996.

Flammer did talk to Campion after learning about Miller's pending resignation, and told her he would be unable to apply due to family considerations. Flammer's daughter, Katie, will play her Walled Lake Central girls basketball games on Thursday nights, when board meetings also are held.

Experience on the board or at the school level is something that would benefit a candidate, said Flammer, who helped make the most-recent appointment to the panel. In July 1994, Marc Siegler was picked to replace Marc Belsky.

"Because of the short time span until the next election, it's helpful if you get people who had experience on the board before or who are active in school activities," Flammer said. "Those are all pluses. . . the board will be looking for people who are interested and willing to make a commitment to the district."
