# Ascending to new heights

## Ripmaster conquers Alaskan adventure

To say the least, Pote Ripmaster's month-long mountaineering expedition was unforgettable.

There were a lot of glaciers and fice climbing made up about 85 percent of the trip." Ripmaster said. Twe been ice climbing for about two years now, and on this trip we climbed things like frozen waterfalls and vertical ice."

"We had to make this river crossing coming off the glaciers," Ripmaster said. "We were wad-

"I got used to living off the land and it's been tough to come back to eivilization," he said. 'I didn't see a dime all the time I was out there - and I liked that - and it's been real hard to return to the everyday grind where everything seems to be money-driven.

"I've always loved the outdoors and I really consider this my best accomplishment in life, one of them at least."


