The raid was the first indication that Ann Arbor was a major area for narcotics trade in Southeastern Michigan.

## 4 Mock Elections Give Nixon The Presidency

Mock Presidential elections were held at four Observersland High Schools recently. Of the 2,993 total votes cast, Richard Nixon received 99.1 per cent and 1,174 votes.

The four schools involved were Stevenson, Claremontville, Ladywood and Plymouth High Schools.

Humphrey received a total of 1,073 votes and 35.8 per cent; Wallace 385 and 12.8 per cent; McCarthy 274 and 9.1 per cent; Pat Paulsen 73 and 2.1 per cent; and 22 votes, 1.1 per cent went to Lolich, Cleaver, Molinari, Dick Gregory and Rockefeller.

Plymouth, which also voted for state offices, was inconsistent with its choices. Nixon led with 863 votes over Humphrey's 465, but Democrats Vivian and Tierney received a total of 1,270 over 933 cast for Republicans Esch and Bergquist.

At Claremontville, Humphrey received 173 votes to win by a slim margin over Nixon's 153. Stevenson students gave Nixon 320 votes for a majority over the 189 cast for Humphrey. Ladywood gave Humphrey 246 votes and 61.6 per cent of the total. Nixon received 118 votes with 29.8 per cent.

Wallace scored well. Plymouth gave him 14.3 per cent with 200 votes; Stevenson 11.1 per cent with 67 votes; Ladywood 35 with 8.7 per cent; and Claremontville 81 votes and 19.9 per cent.

North Farmington and Madonna College are in the process of counting votes for their mock elections. Thurston and St. Agatha High will hold elections on Monday, Nov. 4, and Franklin, Bishop Borgess, and Redford Union High will vote on election day.

## 4-H'ers Demonstrate Livestock Conservation

The 2nd annual 4-H Livestock Conservation Demonstration contest will take place in Chicago on Dec. 3, 3, at the Pick-Congress Hotel, according to the National 4-H Service Committee. It is one of the events scheduled during the National 4-H Congress held the first week in December.

The contest, sponsored by Livestock Conservation, Inc., will bring together some of the nation's top 4-H livestock project members. Last year awarders of \$25 U.S. savings bonds went to 12 entries from nine states. Participants this year also will receive a \$25 bond.

The young farmers demonstration may show livestock loss sustained in shipping cattle to market, damage from parasites, control of cattle grazes, internal injuries caused by foreign objects, and several other causes of injury or death.

Last year's purple ribbon winners were a brother and sister team from Nebraska, while the runners-up were two sisters from North Carolina.

Participants, their parents, 4-H leaders and others associated with the contest will be guests of Livestock Conservation, Inc., at a luncheon.

## Blues Roll In When Gwen Shows 'Sparky'

"When the judge pointed in my direction for first, I just couldn't believe he was pointing at me."

That was 15-year-old Gwen Hendee's reaction when her Springer Spaniel Sparky copped first place in a recent dog show at the Macomb County Kennel Club.

It was a great moment for the North Farmington High School sophomore, daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Charles Hendee, of 26007 Powers. She's been brought up with Springer Spaniels -- the kind that bring home blue ribbons and silver trays and bowls --

because her parents raise the breed to show.

And she's well acquainted with Sparky, officially Champion Canaroh Inchyiny Sparkler. She has been the one to show the handsome black and white male on the occasions when he has won third and fourth place ribbons as well as his first.

"I HAVE CONFIDENCE in myself when I walk into the ring," she said. "But I have more confidence in the dog because I know he's a good one."

Gwen started showing dogs in junior showmanship classes. Here the kids are judged on their ability to show their dog. Professional handlers judge the class because they know the finer points of showing a dog.

"I really think that junior classes are the best way for anyone young to learn how to show a dog," she said.

Gwen also receives a lot of guidance and coaching from her uncle, Clint Harris, of Louisville, who is a well known professional handler.

"A couple times when he had other dogs to show, I had to take Sparky in myself," Gwen said, "and the amazing thing about it was that I won and his dog didn't."

Gwen works a dog that she plans to show every day, starting about three weeks before a show. She increases the length of time everyday so that the dog won't tire if he goes on for the group or later, Best in Show.

GWEN HAS HER OWN dog, an English Cocker named Jill. "My parents bought me a different breed because then it would be my dog," she said, "she is my responsibility and it is my duty to feed her and take care of her needs."

Jill was bought for show purposes but hasn't qualified. Her litter of puppies, however, turned out to be an experience for

both Gwen and her 14-year-old brother, Keith.

"Mom was away and Jill decided to help early, leaving Keith and I to be her nursemaids. Keith didn't quite know what to do so he kept patting her and saying what a good dog she was. Actually he was in a state of panic.

"Then after two pups were born, he came and got me. We both panicked together. But all the pups were born healthy," Gwen said.

Gwen has no immediate plans for the future. She is taking some interior design courses and thinking about a career in art, but also would like to be a professional handler or trimmer.

She keeps busy with school activities, and, like any teen, she listens to the rock stations and likes all types of music, especially a show dog's bark.
