

Olde Franklin Residents Resist Zoning Changes

Olde Franklin Towne Home-owners Association, Farmington, went on record against any effort to change present zoning restrictions in Section 1 of Farmington Township at its recent annual meeting in Fairview School.

A spokesman for the group, Attorney Alan P. Goldstein, emphasized this point before 150 residents of the subdivision present at the meeting.

THREE LAND parcels of concern to the subdivision, said Goldstein, are the 15 acres along Middle Belt and North-westers owned by developer Ivan Frankel, the tract along Middle Belt owned by Hillier Day School and the seven acres along 14 Mile east of Wood-bridge. The latter parcel had been earmarked for a private school but has now been offered for sale.

Farmington School District purchased 20 acres from Frankel last summer to build the district's fifth junior high school. The developer was thwarted by home owners in Section 1 on his original plan to build apartments between Olde Franklin Dr. and Stone-wood Ct.

Sunnydale Requests Sewers

Farmington Township has authorized its consulting engineers to prepare cost estimates and preliminary plans for sanitary sewers on 20 lots on Sunnydale.

Eleve of 14 property owners on the street have asked the township board to investigate sanitary sewers for their areas.

Special assessment district (or districts) will be determined by the township board after estimates are prepared. Public hearing on assessments will be announced when estimates are available, Township Clerk Floyd C. Cairns said.

Study time for estimates will be at least four weeks, Township officials said.
