Five more teonagers have been charged in the destruction of San Marine Golf Course, bringing the total to 10. Five teenagers already pleaded guilty and have been sentenced in the case that involved the destruc-tion of golf carts, sprinkler system, shed and a truck at the city-owned course during a three-day vandalism spree April 24.
