By committing early, Young turns down the chance of making five official visits in the fall. He

also considered Michigan State University, Southern California and Loyola of Chicago.

"It's always been my intention to commit before the season started," Young said. "I didn't think it was fair if I had made up my mind last week, to wait and wait and take visits. I was kind of sick of the mail, phone calls. I've got a stack of letters today.

Especially since he didn't start playing organized basketball until the eighth grade at St. Edith School in Livonia. Young said he was 5-9 in the eighth grade, taller than most of his classmates, but a foot shorter than what he is today. Young played soccer throughout grade school, often with Gino DiGiandomenico, another St. Edith product who decided to take up football when he outgrew soccer. DiGiandomenico grew into a 6-4, 260-pound defensive tackle at CC who signed with Miami of Ohio for football. Young didn't give up soccer

Young didn't give up soccor until his freshman year at CC.
"I watched the first day of soccer tryouts at CC and the little guys were so fast. I said forget it, Young soid. His coach at St. Edith, Chuck Uhlinger, kept him interested in basketball. Uhlinger now coaches at Churchill High School.
"I didn't like the first month of the season, but then coach Uhlinger showed me an interesting drop stop, I started using it and playing well," Young recalls.

Young also credits CC head coach Rick Coratti and assistant John Mulroy as well as former assistant Grog Wendt and train-er David Broz for his develop-

er David Bröz for his development.
Wendt, 6-6, is a former CC and University of Detroit-Mercy standaut who played professionally overseas and the 6-10 Broz is a former Ball State standaut.
Young has had a busy ammer, playing AAU basketball for the Motor Gity Mavericks, coached by Clarkston coach Dan Fife and Walled Lake Central assistant coach from Negoshian. He also spent a week in Indianapolis, Ind. at the Nike All-American camp for the nation's top 100 basketball layers. He experienced his first bit of jet lag when he had to play a summer basketball game for CC a couple bours after a flight bome from the AAU national tournament in Orlando, Fla.
Young said Dane Fife, the

"He's one of the best I've played against and I love his dad," Young said.

Chris doesn't envy all the let-ters his sister might get from col-leges, but he's kind of jealous of her sport.
